## Garden Tip for April

Now is the time to plant select perennial herbs - thyme, lavender, oregano, chives, mint, and sage are perennial herbs that can be planted in April. They require a sunny spot that receives at least 6 to 8 hours of direct sunlight a day. If you have heavy, clay soil, mix in sand and compost at planting time to improve drainage. Herbs will not thrive in wet, mucky soil. Some herbs, such as mint and thyme, are available in a wide range of flavors and scents. Do some research before you purchase herbs to customize your garden to your own personal taste.

## Completion of our First Project!

We recently completed the first project in the back rose garden – the installation of a new controller and the connecting of this new controller to existing valves. This work enables the watering of a portion of the garden that was not receiving any water at all, and it was the cornerstone of other projects that we intend to undertake to revive the back rose garden.
